READ EXODUS 3:1-5

Moses at the Burning Bush

3 Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness and came to Mount Horeb, ^{III} the mountain of God. ² There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. ³ Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight and see why the bush is not burned up." ⁴ When the LORD saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." ⁵ Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground."

"Then Moses said, 'I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up.' Exodus 3:3

PAUSE FOR REFLECTION

We know this. Moses did too. God is not always seen easily, or readily, or clearly. We know this. And Moses did too. We want to see God. Easily. Readily. Clearly.

We want to see God in the midst of our ordinary: when we are fishing, our lines waiting for a tug, when we are hanging beach towels on the line, when we are playing baseball cheering a line drive. We want to see God in the midst of our every day.

Moses is going about his daily business. He is working for his father-in-law as a caretaker of a flock of sheep. In this everyday pasture, Moses sees an ordinary bush burning with a sense of Presence.

It compels him to turn aside and notice. He takes off his sandals and lets himself be in the moment. This is holy ground. It's a beautiful story, a beautiful mystery.

Fact is, there are burning bushes everywhere. This I believe. The miracle is turning aside to see, to notice, to pay attention. The Divine is intricately woven into the material. Incarnation is at the heart of the created order. Everywhere is Holy Ground.

Everywhere. Cherish the daily. God is not always seen easily, or readily, or clearly. But everywhere is holy ground. Practice turning aside.

PRAYER

While we cannot always fully see the Heart of Fire, this we know. *"My Presence will go with you."*

PRACTICE "READING BETWEEN THE LINES"

We pause to step back from the heat of the day and the pace of our summer life. If it is evening, name the activities of this day. If it is morning, recall the day immediately past. Choose ordinary moments you want to treasure or bothersome moments that need repair. Name them and hold them gently, lovingly.

Looking back, can you see moments where you have drawn strength or pleasure or rest for your soul? When you glimpsed new meaning? Are there moments that stir you to compassion or move your heart to action?

You are seeing with the eyes of your heart. You are seeing how we meet the Divine in the midst of the ordinary and in the stuff of daily life.

So as this day ends, or as the day goes on we will not forget in the activities of all our days we are meeting You already. We are meeting you already.
