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2. WONDER: A Lined & Weathered Face

SCRIPTURE FROM GENESIS 1:1-5 & 2:4-7

Six Days of Creation and the Sabbath

1 When God began to create the heavens and the earth, ² the earth was complete chaos, and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. ³ Then God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. ⁴ And God saw that the light was good, and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

⁴ These are the generations of the heavens and the earth when they were created.

Another Account of the Creation

In the day that the LORD[®] God made the earth and the heavens, ⁵ when no plant of the field was yet in the earth and no vegetation of the field had yet sprung up—for the LORD God had not caused it to rain upon the earth, and there was no one to till the ground, ⁶ but a stream would rise from the earth and water the whole face of the ground— ⁷ then the LORD God formed man from the dust of the ground[®] and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being.

PAUSE FOR REFLECTION

The first universe story in Genesis 1 is a litany of days. The gifts of light, water, the dry land and green and growing things, the sun and moon, the creatures that fly in the air and swim in the water and the creatures that walk upon the earth, including us, the humans, come into being.

And it is good. It is very good.

The second universe story in Genesis 2 is earthy and intimate. Here streams of water are stirred up until the whole surface of earth is irrigated, and then so tenderly —

"The Great God,
like a mammy bending over her baby,
kneeled in the dust, toiling over a lump of clay...
And we "became a living soul. Amen. Amen."
